COMMUNITY GARDEN

We regret to inform the Village of Marwayne residents that the community garden pilot project will not be moving ahead. Although we had some interest, we did not have anyone submit the required forms or remit payment for participation in the program. That being said, we would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their interest and participation in the survey that was circulated.

We are hopeful that perhaps we can revisit the pilot project at a later date and be more successful in attracting enough people to make it a go.

Council Highlight

- The Village of Marwayne provided letters of support for the Lloydminster Regional Housing Group's funding request and the Marwayne Agricultural Society's Community Facility Enhancement Grant Application for the upgrades to the arena.
- Council proclaimed June 15th as World Elder Abuse Day.
- The Village of Marwayne renewed its lease agreement with Bell Canada for another 3 year term.
- Council accepted the offer to purchase 25 Centre Street at a cost of \$8000 for the purposes of building a new restaurant in town.
- The Village of Marwayne reviewed the Regional Emergency Management Collaborative Proposal prepared by the City of Lloydminster.
- Council adopted the splash park policies—available on our website.
- Council is looking forward to the playground board's presentation at our next meeting on July 17th, as well as presentations from MCSNet regarding GigAir and Brian Weisbrod, the interim Corporal at the Kitscoty RCMP detachment.
- We remind you that Council meetings are held every third Monday in the ATB Financial Boardroom and are open to the public. Should you wish to address Council however, you must submit a request in writing to the Chief Administrative Officer at cao@marwayne.ca.



A person shall not cause or permit a nuisance to exist on Property they Own or Occupy such as grass higher than 25 centimeters excluding naturalized areas on public property or excess weeds.





ADVICE FOR MY GRIEF JOURNEY

SHARING: Find a safe person to share the burden of grief will help the moving forward through the grief process. Sharing thoughts, feelings, time and most of all love is good.

EXPECTATIONS: Don't be disappointed if others don't have all the support needed. Find more that one good listener. Others may be carrying burdens in their lives too.

HELP or HINDER: Others may want to help but may not understand the lack of energy, sleeping or eating problems and range of emotions. Try not to judge them. Remember before grief the lack of understanding possessed? Help them to seek to understand the journey by gently telling them.

ORDER OUT OF CHAOS: When loss and grief happen in lives, life becomes out of control. Try to gain some order and routine in the day. Like putting the dishes away or sweeping the floor.ie putting something in its place.

SEEK SUPPORT: Look for support in all the right places. Not just family and friends as they all have busy lives too. Find support groups for those who grieve, Counsellors to confide in and support sites on line. (Check them out to make sure they are really supportive).

CARINFG FOR SELF: Those who grieve are the last persons to care about self at this time but are worth it. Supporting the immune system at this time with good nutrition, exercise, rest, reduced alcohol and other substances is important. Build coping skills and find a balance between work, rest and positive activities.

AWE and GRATITUDE: Focus who is important in life and not on who is no longer in it. Remember gratitude and the loved one but slowly begin to shift focus to life, living and future. How can we honor our loved one by how we live our future?

IT'S OK TO LAUGH AND CRY: The heavy weight of grief can cloud our minds and the expectations put on self. Find joy in the little things. Be childlike hopeful, sadness coming like waves, while still looking to the future. Try to be in the present. Don't be shocked to hear your own laughter. Give self permission and don't feel guilt for a moment of happiness. Laughing and crying is good for health.

GRIEF IS HARD WORK: Take time to rest the mind and body. So much time has been spent on reflecting over the illness or accident and how to adjust to a new life without that person in it. Quiet time is a healing time and is as vital as activities.

WHY AND HOW COME: Some questions may never have answers. Trying to make sense and meaning of what has happened is part of the mourner's journey but doesn't change the outcome.

STAYING SAFE: Those who grieve are often more vulnerable and misunderstood and can be taken advantage of. Grief is individual but it is good to know those who have a commonality and where one feels understood.

THE BIG PICTURE: When death claims a loved one we sense our mortality. A parent's death we become "next generation", a child's death we feel the guilt of still being alive after them, and a spousal loss there is that loss of purpose. In these times you may seek spiritual guidance, counselling or group support. Have a list of 5 "go to" friends that you can call for emotional support and a companion to journey with you, so your journey isn't so lonely.

June once again saw a very active month for the Ag Society!

The Street Dance was a roaring success once again thanks to the beautiful weather and hard work of our volunteers. Thank you to Elaine Kent & Jamie Day for all their work organizing and running the event. The Ag Society works hard to provide this event free of charge for all to enjoy!

The Pancake Breakfast saw some of the biggest attendance in a long time serving over 325 people. The Ag Society is proud to offer this breakfast for just \$5, and word on the street is its one of the best around!

Huge thanks to Bobby Jo Calder for stepping up to take over organization of and running the pancake breakfast! As well to Zach Hines who takes care of the volunteers and setup prior to the event.

Thank you to all the volunteers who came out to help – Travis Cooke, Quinn Moon, Dale Midgley, Owen Johnston, Kirsten Hnatow, Jeremy Pashniak, Ryan Rose and Justin Holland.

The Rodeo saw three great days of weather and three days of full crowds on the hill and in the beer gardens. This hard-working committee put on a fantastic show and a great homecoming for our community.

Congratulations to Riley Applegate who won the side by side raffle and Terry Clark who won the truck raffle. Both raffles sold out by Saturday at the rodeo; great work to the curling rink and rodeo committee for their hard work selling tickets. These fundraisers are a huge part of the success of both groups.

Hailey Brind Memorial Ball Tournament: July 22 & 23

Over the coming 2 years there will be a large push from the arena and ag society to fundraise for some large capital projects. The first priority is within the arena. This project includes removing all of the boards, plexiglass and bleachers surrounding the ice surface. As well the entire cement ice surface and brine lines will be removed. All of this will then be replaced with new material.

Marwayne Ag Society—July Update

A little history: the brine lines and cement surface was put in in 1982 in both the arena and curling rink. These lines have far outlived their life expectancy and we are living on borrowed time. The arena currently has one exterior brine line that has failed. The boards and glass surrounding the ice surface are in dire need of repair as they are completely worn out. We have received a \$100,000 grant to go towards the replacement of the boards and plexiglass.

We have also applied for significant grant money for the ice surface replacement. Fundraising plans include the Gord Bamford Concert (Sept 8), Ladies Night Out (Feb 2024) and an online auction. More to come as well as the arena group works together with the Ag Society to raise the needed funds.

Future endeavors will include replacing the brine lines and surface in our curling rink and replacing the ice plant that services both the arena and curling rink.

We appreciate all the support shown to our Ag Society and the facilities we maintain. There aren't a lot of communities that have such well-maintained facilities to utilize and such a wide variety of activities to offer, but we are proud to be one of those few communities.

A Pastor's Gleanings

There was a Salvation Army church that posted this invitation on its marquee:

"You know what we do . . . Come inside to find out why."

When I hear "Salvation Army" I think about the tinkling bells during the Christmas shopping season at malls, large stores, and grocery stores. The Salvation Army is and has been one of the most trusted charities. Their reputation for getting the most "bang for your buck" is stellar. The Salvation Army operates kitchens where people in need can get a meal. They provide shelters where people can stay who have no other place to go. They work with and counsel troubled youth. Again, as the marquee states: "Come inside to find out why." I'll give you a hint... It's big... It's bigger than saying, "I believe in Jesus." Our deeds of loving service are a verification of our faith in Christ. We come to church to hear God's word, to pray and sing praises to our Lord, and to have fellowship with others of the same mind and heart.
